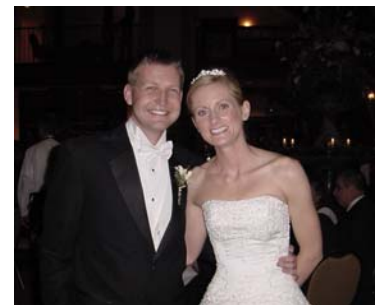

2005 FIJI LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

In 1949 at Denison University, Phi Gamma Delta started a dynamic leadership program that would benefit chapters all across the nation by teaching chapters how to mold their future leaders into successful ones. Now fifty-five years later the FIJI Leadership Academy continues to fine tune brothers into guides for great leadership and service.

The 2005 FIJI Academy was held in St. Louis, Missouri on January 7th through the 9th at the Union Station Hotel, a once thriving train station turned mall and hotel. Theta Tau had one of the largest representations of all the attending chapters. Composed of nine undergraduates: J.R. Gillette, Ben Goddard, Jared Medlin, Justin Jolly, Luke Denney, Kyle Davis, Mo Elbeitam, Matt

Hickey, and Josh McGrew and two graduate brothers: Brian Douglas and Brent Ellis representing Theta Tau.

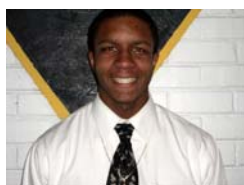

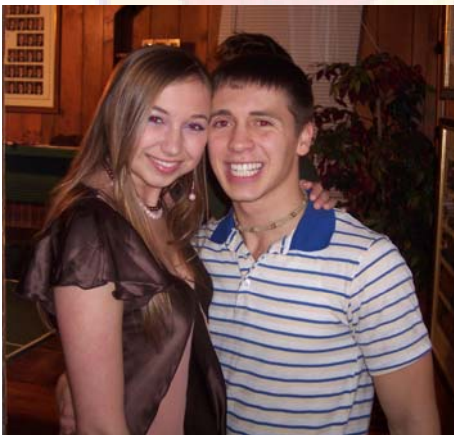
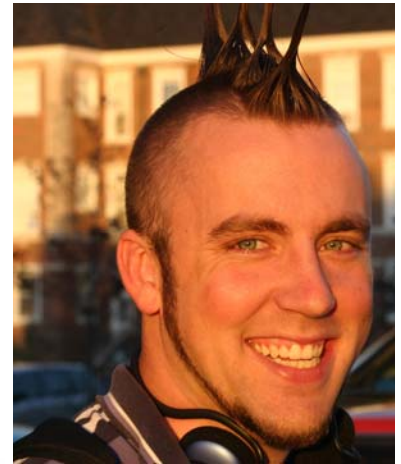

Scholastic achievement is very important to the brothers of Theta Tau. After all, scholarship is one of our five values. Last year our chapter performed very well academically, however we did fall short of our goal of a 3.0 chapter GPA. Our chapter's average GPA was 2.86 with the pledge class average at 2.85. Moving forward it is imperative that we implement new ideas to improve pledge class scholarship.

There were 40 brothers that made a 3.0 or higher out of our 80 man chapter, with three people making a 4.0. (Six Clicks!). We had four-

teen brothers make the Dean's list last semester, 3.5 or better GPA.

Compared to the other fraternities we finished second to Sigma Chi who had a GPA of 2.962. Our chapter did better than both the all Greek average which was 2.685 and the all male average 2.616. Theta Tau will continue to push for our goal of 3.0 as we move into this new year. Last semester amendments were made to the by-laws increasing the minimum GPA to pledge, be initiated, serve as a committee chairman, and to be on cabinet. We hope that this across the

board increase will help us attract and retain quality individuals to better our chapter. We will continue to raise the bar, and strive to attain our goals.
